NH Chapter Prepared to Move Forward

During the first week of August, I attended the Appraisal Institute's Regional and National meetings in San Diego, CA representing the New Hampshire Chapter of the Appraisal Institute, Many topics were covered that may be of interest to all NH appraisers. First, the state of the Appraisal Institute was addressed. The AI will designate 500-600 individuals this year, the most since the 1990's. The Appraisal Institute has 27% of all appraisers nationwide and total membership is up from last year with large increases coming from the international membership. While other appraisal organizations are struggling with membership and financial issues, the



Appraisal Institute has grown and made recent financial cost cutting modifications that should benefit its bottom line in the future.

The Candidate for Designation Program (C4D) will begin 1/1/2013. This program modifies the membership classifications and sharpens the focus on the designated members.

While the Appraisal Institute will make promoting the education benefits of designated appraisers a priority, they will continue to have a place for all real estate appraisers. Current Associates will decide if they want to become a C4D, a Practicing Affiliate (PA) or an Affiliate. The C4D program is continually being detailed and updated on the Al website. Timelines and education requirements are being laid out and a new Advisor Program is in the works under which each C4D will be paired up with an existing designated member to provide guidance to the candidate along the way to designation.

It was an honor to represent the NH Chapter at the Leadership Development and Advisory Conference (LDAC) in Washington, DC in May. LDAC was a fascinating

insight into the national organization and an opportunity to connect with appraisers from all over the US and Mexico.

LDAC started with a panel discussion led by former Appraisal Institute presidents discussing traits of good leaders in the Appraisal Institute. Their advice: take lots of classes, be a good listener, be sincere, selfless and have integrity (people see through the BS), don't worry about getting credit for the volunteer work you do, surround yourself with smart people, and

The new Practicing Affiliate classification allows for the individual real estate appraiser to remain associated with the Appraisal Institute.

The Affiliate classification will continue to be utilized by other real estate professionals. The NH Chapter will be making contact with each of the current Associates in order to answer questions allowing for each Associate to make the classification selection that works best for them.

Some AI chapters have been struggling to operate as they cannot find enough volunteers to run the chapter effectively. A few of the smaller chapters are merging with a neighboring chapter. The Rhode Island Chapter is similar in size to the NH Chapter and is merging with the Massachusetts Chapter because they can't find enough volunteers to continue as a chapter. The NH Chapter has been fortunate in recent years because several core board members have stayed on to cover critical board positions for many years. As the Appraisal Institute changes and modifies its organization so it can compete

and lead nationally and globally, the NH Chapter will continue to operate as it has in the past. We will continue to offer the 2-hour CE seminars five times a year along with USPAP and other continuing education classes. As a chapter, we are financially strong with a dedicated group on the board of directors. We will continue to be the leading appraisal organization in New Hampshire and will make available local seminar and class offerings. However, in order for this to continue, we need for each individual appraiser who is currently associated with the AI to continue to support the local NH Chapter.

If you are not designated, you can become a C4D or you can remain active as a Practicing Affiliate or an Affiliate. You can also make it a point to attend the local seminar or class offerings sponsored by the NH Chapter. With everyone supporting the NH Chapter in one way or another, the financial needs of the chapter will be met and it will be business as usual in New Hampshire.

learn from successful leaders.

The chairman of Al's Strategic Planning Commission gave an update on industry trends, commoditization, alternate valuation products and providers and government regulation. The Appraisal Institute faces large challenges in the coming years including an aging appraiser population, 50% of whom are expected to retire in the next 5-10 years. Not surprisingly, the median age of an MAI is 60 years and 61 years for an SRA. The industry is replacing these retirees at a very slow rate. It was heartening to see so many young (under 40) designated men and women at LDAC. They are the future of the organization.

The Appraisal Institute's lobbyists in DC went over the appraisal issues we would discuss with our Senators and Reps the next day on Capitol Hill. One was the "Responsible Home Refinancing Act" in the Senate and the other was the Financial Institutions Examination Fairness & Reform Act" in both the Senate & House. Both bills threaten to legislate appraisers out of the lending process. Our pitch to Capitol Hill was to keep the appraiser and our valuation tools in the process.

I had a private discussion with Senator Jeanne Shaheen and her financial services aide about the issues. I also met with representatives from Sen. Ayotte and Rep. Charlie
Bass's offices (the House
was in recess that week).
Everyone on Capitol Hill
was gracious and generous
with their time. These
meetings made the
Appraisal Institute visible
on Capitol Hill and
established professional
contacts for future lobbing
efforts.

The best part of LDAC, for me, was the discussion topics during which we broke out in eight groups and rotated through the following topics:

- 1) Technology: Moving at the Speed of Light
- Distinguishing Al Member Work Product from Non-Member Work Product
- 3) The Aging of Appraisers: How Does the Industry Attract New Young Professionals?
- 4) Diversifying the Practices of SRA/Residential Members.

These discussions were brainstorming sessions and an unusually candid opportunity to be heard by the Appraisal Institute's national leadership. President Sara Stevens, MAI was there as was 2013 president Rick Borges, MAI, SRA and vice presidents Ken Wilson, MAI, SRA and Lance Coyle, MAI, SRA.

I'd like to thank the NH Chapter's board of directors for sponsoring my trip to LDAC. It was a wonderful experience and I'd recommend it to any interested in advancing in Al leadership or lobbying on appraisal issues.

Candidate for Designation (C4D)

The board of directors of the New Hampshire Chapter of the Appraisal Institute is initiating a program to help appraisers decide which path to take with the new Candidates for Designation (C4D) program from Al-National. As you no doubt know, the Appraisal Institute is doing away with the "associate member" status and is encouraging all appraisers to pursue either the MAI or SRA designation. If designation isn't the right path for you, there will be a "Practicing Affiliate" or PA. We hope all Associates will choose to remain in the organization one way or the other.

We encourage you to go to www.appraisalinstitute.org, log into your account and check your Associate Status Report in the left hand column. It will explain exactly which requirements you have already fulfilled and which remain. If you sign up for the designation path before January 1, 2013, you will retain credit for all designation requirements already fulfilled.

After January 1, 2013, you could lose credit for some requirements and have start over.

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You may be surprised at how far along you already are. Even if you aren't sure whether you want to pursue designation yet, you'll be better off declaring as a C4D now so you don't lose credit for those past courses.

Also on the Al website are a Power Point presentation, a video and a webinar that will answer many of your questions. If you sign-up by October 31, you get a discount of \$25. Either way, payment won't be due until 1/1/13.

Designated Members - please consider volunteering as an Advisor for our new Candidate for Designation Program. Each advisor will work with a candidate as a mentor and chapter representative in order to encourage and help future Candidates become Designated Members.
